## President's Message

The high standards of our Academy that we value are dependent on commitment, effort, and support of members, committees, directors and officers. We have the dedicated members to ensure the outstanding character of our Academy but our officers and committee chairs have limited exposure to many outstanding individuals. The primary support for the AAFP comes from the loyalty of all our members. *If you would like to serve in some additional capacity please tell Secretary Denny Smith.*

The concept of a central office has been evaluated periodically but has always been avoided to keep expenses down and to maintain personal contact between members when conducting business. The personal contact with Academy members rather than with central office staff is an important part of the culture of our Academy. Also, management through a central office has been shown to increase the cost of operation.

Secretary *Denny Smith* and Treasurer/Secretary for Guests *Rick Jordan* serve our Academy with tremendous dedication and affection. They receive minimal financial compensation. Serving as president has made me realize how labor intensive their jobs

are, especially when done with sensitivity toward our members and guests. I always realized how important their positions were but never imagined how much work it involved.

*Bob Staffanou* and *Don Garver* had assumed responsibility for tasks that could be done by committees. The Academy is at risk when it becomes necessary to replace the Secretary or Treasurer/Secretary for Guests because of the huge responsibility these positions now entail. Therefore, though they are glad to work as hard as they do, *Denny* and *Rick* are helping redistribute some of the work *Bob* and *Don* had assumed that can, and should, be done by committees. They are also identifying and supporting changes of technology that can enhance effectiveness for members while making their jobs less cumbersome. ## Notes from the Secretary

### ACADEMY MEMBERSHIP

*Dr. Denny Smith*

Currently the American Academy of Fixed Prosthodontics membership consists of **462** active members and **156** life members. Over the past twelve years total membership (active and life members) has increased slowly, by 22%, from 508 to 618. That change is constituted by an increase in active members from 414 to 462, a 12% increase, and an increase in life members from 94 to 159, a 69% increase.

The numbers of applications for membership, resignations, applications for life membership and deaths have – with an occasional spike – remained relatively constant over the past dozen years. The number of countries represented in the Academy has remained relatively constant, currently at 22 countries. The only dramatic change in Academy membership numbers is the 69% increase in life members, now an enriched cohort that provides a repository of wisdom for the organization.

The health of the Academy in the decades ahead will continue to be directly related to the retention of active members and to the recruitment of highly qualified new members. *It is the current membership that locates, assesses and nominates active generalists and prosthodontists whose professional excellence and interest in fixed prosthodontics qualify them for membership.* Membership in the American Academy of Fixed Prosthodontics continues to be an honor, and this is time of year when such discernment is most appropriate.

### BY-LAWS CHANGES

*Dr. Gerald Santulli*

The following are By-laws changes as approved by the Board of Directors Meeting during the August 2008 that will be presented to the general membership for ratification at the February 2009 Annual Meeting:

The By-Laws committee will be charged with proposing an amendment to **remove the attendance requirement** under Section 2B for the summer meeting. Section 2, paragraph B 1 will be **deleted (in red)** and paragraphs 2,3 and 4 will be re-numbered as paragraphs 1,2 and 3 respectively.

**Section 2. Dues, Journal Subscription, Membership Suspension, Academy Property.**

#### **B. Suspension or Expulsion From Membership**

##### ~~1. FAILURE TO ATTEND MEETINGS REGULARLY:~~

~~a. In the event that a member does not attend two successive annual meetings, the member shall be automatically suspended from all privileges of membership. For those members residing in foreign countries outside the geographic limits to North and Central America, suspension will follow after missing three successive meetings. The Secretary of The Academy shall send notice as soon as possible notifying the member of their suspension by electronic mail, return receipt requested mail return receipt requested fax. An appeal to the Board of Directors may be requested following receipt of notice of the membership being suspended. If, within ninety (90) days after being notified of suspension, the members fails to show justifiable cause, in writing, to the Board of Directors, the membership shall be automatically revoked without the need for action by the Board of Directors or the General Membership. If, in the opinion of the Board of Directors, the suspended member shows justifiable cause for absence, he/she shall be reinstated. An appeal to the Board of Directors may be requested following receipt of notice of the membership being revoked.~~

~~2. 1. Failure to Pay Membership Dues.~~

~~3. 2. Failure to Participate in the Administration or Scientific Activities of The Academy~~

~~4. 3. Conduct Unbecoming a Member of The Academy~~

The By-laws committee will be charged with a re-write of the membership of the Historical Committee. The committee will be **increased by two members** and the Academy Secretary will also be added to the committee.

#### **Article VII**

**1. 1.** The Historical Committee shall consist of two (2) **four (4) members** with the chairman being designated by the President. **In addition, The Academy Secretary will be a member of the committee.** The chairman shall act for The Academy in an advisory capacity to the Smithsonian Institute for dental exhibits. Each member shall serve for a term of five (5) years.

The By-laws committee is charged with **changing SRO 18** with regards to the statement of dues. Article III Section 2, paragraph A currently authorizes the Board of Directors to set dues, however, SRO 18 includes the statement of current dues and requires a vote by the membership at the annual business meeting to make any changes in the stated amounts. The amount of time that transpires from the time the Board determines and sets dues and the business meeting where a vote is necessary to change the stated amount of dues in SRO18 is insufficient to the anticipate financial requirements of the Academy. The re-write of SRO 18 will remove the specific stated amounts of the yearly dues. It is anticipated that announcement of changes in the dues will be made in the Academy newsletter, Academy website and annual business meeting agenda.

**18.** The official currency for all AAFP transactions, including dues, is in the US Dollar. Dues for Active Members shall be ~~\$450.00 USA, \$460.00 Canada/Mexico and \$470.00 International~~, plus will include the cost of the official journal of the Academy, rounded up to the nearest dollar. Dues and journal subscription for foreign member dues shall reflect the additional costs incurred in the administration of their membership. The cost of the journal cannot be deducted from the dues.

The ADA Foundation supports dental education, access to care, research and provides charitable assistance. <sup>4</sup>Finally, the family of each member receives a letter of condolence, a copy of a resolution honoring the deceased, and the notice of actions taken in response to the member's death.

## In Memoriam

*Dr. Edgar Neal Kopp* died on March 28, 2008, a victim of amyotrophic lateral sclerosis. Neal left Emma Jane, his wife of 54 years, his daughter Kathy and his son Steven.

Dr. Kopp, born in Danville, Pennsylvania, spent his developmental years in Tower City. He graduated from Temple University School of Dentistry in 1957, and gave 27 years service in the United States Army. Following several postings in the United States and Europe, Neal retired as a colonel and Commander of Dental Activity and Director, Dental Education at Fort Gordon, Georgia. Dr. Kopp was awarded the Surgeon General's "A" Prefix in the Specialty Area of Fixed Prosthodontics, the highest award granted by the Army Medical Department.

Following his military retirement, Neal served in several portfolios at Emory University School of Dentistry, including service as Associate Dean for Clinical Affairs. Neal's love for the profession led him into private practice in Sandy Springs, Georgia, where he practiced until a short time before his death.

Neal's rich professional life was balanced with a love of family, golf, fine food and informal service to others.

Dr. Long is a 1976 graduate of Baylor College of Dentistry. He spent 16 years in research and instruction guiding students in clinical care and directing the second year

preclinical fixed prosthodontics laboratory course. Dr. Long practiced restorative dentistry for 23 years primarily in fixed prosthodontics.

An interest in the academic, ethical and professional preparation of students admitted to the College drew him first to the Admissions Committee and eventually to the position of Director of Admissions where he served for twelve years. Currently he serves as the Associate Dean for Student Affairs responsible for all facets of student life including professional counseling at Texas A&M Health Science Center Baylor College of Dentistry. In that role he has served in numerous College and Health Science Center committees with responsibilities for policies pertaining to financial aid, admissions, student tuition and fees, curriculum issues and legal compliance in areas with regard to higher education.

In addition to the American Academy of Fixed Prosthodontics, his professional associations include American Dental Association and the Texas State and local components, Southwest Academy of Restorative Dentistry, American Dental Education Association and the American and Texas Associations of Collegiate Registrars and Admissions Officers.



### DIRECTOR: *Dr. E. Ricardo Schwedhelm*

E. Ricardo Schwedhelm is an Associate Professor, Department of Restorative Dentistry, at the University of Washington in Seattle, WA. He also maintains a private

prosthodontic restorative practice in Seattle. Dr. Schwedhelm received his dental degree from U.N.I.T.E.C. (Mexico City, Mexico) in 1978 and obtained his M.S.D. and Certificate in Fixed and Removable Prosthodontics as well as a Diploma in Complete Prosthodontics with a minor in Dental Materials from Indiana University in 1983. He practiced in West Vancouver Canada for 18 years during which time he was a licensed Specialist in Prosthodontics. He received his Fellowship in the Royal College of Dentists of Canada in the specialty of Prosthodontics in 1995. He has been actively involved in committee work and has served on the boards of a number of organizations. In 2008 he served as AAFP program chair. In addition to receiving a number of teaching awards, he has published articles and has presented on Prosthodontic topics at various meetings throughout North America. Among his professional memberships are the American Dental Association, the American Academy of Fixed Prosthodontics, the Association of Prosthodontists of Canada, the Washington State Society of Prosthodontics, the John F. Johnson Society, the Academy of Microscope Enhanced Dentistry, and the International College of Dentists.
