



AMERICAN ACADEMY OF CROWN AND BRIDGE PRESIDENTIAL BIOGRAPHY



GEORGE H. MOULTON, DDS

PRESIDENT, AACB 1957-1958

George H Moulton was a founding member and first Secretary of the American Academy of Crown and Bridge Prosthodontics and was the sixth president. He was born in Kasota, MN on November 15, 1912. He later attended Adolphus College and was awarded a B.A. degree in 1928. He graduated from the University of Minnesota School of Dentistry in 1935. He served for one year as a dental intern at Forsyth Dental Infirmary and upon completion entered private dental practice until

1939. Like many young men of his age, and including the first several presidents of the American Academy of Crown and Bridge, he entered the military service.

He entered the Dental Corps of the United States Army and served, until discharge in November 30, 1954 with the rank of Lt. Colonel. During his service in the U. S. Army Dental Corp, he spent a year in a postgraduate program in Crown and Bridge Prosthodontics at the University of California San Francisco, finishing in 1948. Following discharge from the US Army he practiced in private practice in San Antonio, TX (1954-'55).

He entered academics in 1955 and was elevated to Professor and Chairman, Department of Crown and Bridge and Director of Clinics, Emory University School of Dentistry, Atlanta, Georgia. He held this position until 1961. He became Dean of Emory University School of Dentistry and served in that position from 1961-1979 from where he retired.

Dr. Moulton was a member of the American Dental Association, American Association of Dental Schools, and the American Academy of Fixed Prosthodontics (AACB). He was also a Fellow, American College of Dentists, OKU, Consultant to the Dental Service at Fort Bragg, NC and Fort Benning, GA. George also was a past test constructor for the National Boards in Dentistry, and a Member of the Dental Education Review Committee, He also served as a member of the Biomaterials Research Advisory Committee, National Institute for Dental Research.

Dr. Moulton served in several capacities with the AAFP and was the president in 1958. The prestigious George Moulton Award for the AAFP is named in his honor.
